

FACTS FOR TEEN DRIVERS

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Teens have the highest

crash rate of any group of drivers in the United States.²



Having a single teen passenger increases a teen driver's crash risk by 44%, while a teen driver carrying at least one passenger over age 35 cuts the risk of death by 62%.³



Teens who say their parents

set rules and monitor their activities in a helpful, supportive way are half as likely to crash and 70% less likely to drive intoxicated than teens who describe their parents as less involved.⁶



Among crashes attributed to a critical teen driver error, 21% of serious teen driver crashes were due to driving too fast for road conditions.1



out of 10 teen crashes involve driver distraction.²
